Sybil and Tina encourage parents and students to check out the library after their Geneva Middle School orientation. Not only did they come to check out the new teen space, but staff also created several new library cards for teens *and* their parents!

Geneva schools are back in session. We had more than 400 tweens/teens walk through the doors after school on the first few days of classes (August 26 - 29). The teen patrons seemed excited to have their own space, and the adults were excited to have access to the rest of the library during after school hours.

PUBLIC SERVICE

• 17,323 visitors entered the doors of the Ashtabula, Geneva, and Bookmobile libraries during the month of August, with 11,140 items borrowed remotely from our Digital Library. 242 documents were notarized (double that of August 2024! and with no cost

to patrons) and **272 free faxes were sent** with the assistance of Ashtabula and Geneva staff.

- The **community organizations** that used the Robert S. Morrison Foundation Room, Ashtabula Foundation Room and other spaces in the library in August included: AARP, Alzheimer's Support Group, Ashcraft, Ashtabula County Genealogical Society, Ashtabula/Harbor High Alumni Association, Ashtabula Lions Club, Ashtabula Metropolitan Housing Authority, Ashtabula Municipal Court (Recovery Court Graduation), Bethlehem Experience, Building Resiliency Together, CJ Prentiss Education & Resource Center, Common Ground of NE Ohio, Cuyahoga County Board of Health, Democratic Party Writer's Workshop, Woman's Fortnightly (book) Club, Legal Aid, Lenape Native Path, LGBTQ+ Coalition, NEO Fund, Partners with a Purpose, Second Chance Citizen's Circle (Catholic Charities), Senior Care Network, Wellness Initiative for Senior Education, Youngstown Business Incubator.
- Community organizations that used meeting spaces in the Geneva Library included Ashtabula County Health Department, Ashtabula County Master Gardeners, Aspire, Community Counseling Center, Geneva Athletic Boosters, Geneva Country Quilters, Geneva Rotary Club, Life Without Chains (NA Group), Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities, Platt R. Spencer Historical Society, and Spencerian Writers Group.
- Outreach Services made 17 **House Call** visits distributing 86 items, and 15 **Express Delivery** stops delivering 52 items. 241 items were left during seven (7) stops to **Drop Locations** throughout ACDL's service area.
- Sonya Vedmar from the American Heart Association joined us to kick off our participation in **Libraries with Heart.** Sonya gave an overview of the program, shared heart healthy tips, and demonstrated the stationary blood pressure monitor that will stay in the Geneva Library. She also gifted both buildings portable blood pressure monitors that patrons may check out.
- The Geneva library distributed six (6) **COVID test kits**; the Ashtabula library, twenty-two.
- The Edith R. Morrison & Mary W. Morrison Genealogy and Archive was visited by 140 patrons in August including visitors from California and Maryland. Nearly 450 resources were used.

PROGRAMMING

- The Geneva Cookbook Club enjoyed the book, We the Pizza by Muhammad Abdul-Hadi, with recipes by Michael Carter. Centered around a pizza shop in North Philadelphia, the book delighted club members with its unique graphics and typeset. All were touched by the stories of former inmates who work at the shops, and all were intrigued by the unusual ingredients used in many of the recipes.
- Lizz welcomed six (6) people to **Coffee and Conversation** who were thrilled with the snack selection and impressed by the September Adult book displays. Discussions centered on the ongoing drama with the wife of the Cleveland Heights mayor; a zoo in Denmark that asks patrons to donate their animals as feed (which led to a conversation about humane societies, ethical euthanasia and the grave situation our local APL is facing); unclaimed Guinness World Records (as Guinness World Records celebrates its 70th year!); and a Japanese city weighing limiting smartphone use to two (2) hours per day.
- Patrons used 5.5-millimeter crotchet hooks and 100% cotton yarn to learn how to crotchet Granny Square Coasters in **DIY programs** held in both Geneva and Ashtabula. Patrons learned the basic principles of crotchet, and even though many mistakes were made, the participants learned that the size of the crochet hook and the type of yarn matter. Everyone completed at least one coaster, and many completed the set! (After Geneva DIY concluded, Keith gave participants a tour of the new addition in Geneva. They were especially impressed by the Studio and its capabilities.)
- Tina spearheaded the last two Creative Kids sessions with Kids Only Daycare, one with Keith and one with Teresa. Both sessions had 23 in attendance. At the first session, they enjoyed building with Keva planks, LEGO's and Magna-tiles, as well as cutting, coloring and making a vegetable patch, and using new alphabet tiles to build sentences. They were also tasked with choosing a biography from the children's collection and followed a template to complete basic info on their chosen person, detailing things like birth and death dates, what country the person was from, why were they famous, and other miscellaneous facts about their person. Taylor Swift, Marco Polo, George Washington, Roberto Clemente and Steph Curry were some of the chosen subjects.
- Tina hosted three (3) well-attended Geneva **Storytime** gatherings using the themes: *V is for Vegetables* with 45 attending; *B is for Baseball* with 33 guests; and *Back to School* with 35 children and caregivers in attendance. Learning worksheets pertaining to each theme and letter, along with coloring sheets and a simple craft, were also offered. A

favorite during the baseball themed week was learning the 7th inning stretch song *Take Me Out to the Ball Game* and the creation of baseball players with accordion legs.

- Ashtabula **Storytime** participants retold the story *Silly Sally* using the flannel board. The Storytime frog puppet helped the children sing *Five Little Speckled Frogs* before reading the pop-up book, <u>The Wide Mouth Frog</u>. Several new families joined this month and said they were excited to keep bringing their toddlers to Storytime!
- Preschoolers at **Rhythm Band for Preschoolers** particularly enjoyed learning a new song called *Pass the Beanbag* where all the children sat in a circle and passed a beanbag around slowly and quickly to practice tempo.
- Ashtabula **Little Scientists** learned about telescopes and constellations. Students painted and decorated paper tube telescopes which they used to look at constellation cards. They also learned about Biome Diorama and each was tasked with creating a diorama of either a Savannah biome or a Taiga biome. They learned about the five major biomes and how their ecosystems are different from one another.
- Little Scientists in Geneva made slime using a Borax recipe. Students had a great time playing with the slime and studying the varying results of using different quantities of Borax. The following week students learned how to code. Using OZO the robot, students programed the coding mice to complete several mazes that they built. They also learned binary coding techniques through making a beaded necklace and using code in the pattern of the beads.
- Teens, too, learned the binary coding technique by using codes in beads for a bracelet or necklace in **Mad Science**. They also helped build mazes and programed the coding mice to complete more complex mazes.
- Teens enjoyed making pony bead animals during Geneva's **Teen Crafternoon.** Using string and pony beads, they created alligators, frogs, and more! and had the option to put a clasp on their creations to turn them into backpack charms.
- In Afterschool Art Club, teens completed a Meet the Artist form that they were able to decorate and doodle on while also telling a bit about themselves. After filling out their forms, each student created a folding self-portrait which unfolded to show the inner workings of their minds (things they like or hobbies they have; things that they felt represented who they are; etc.)
- Signs, Signals, & Codes is a new weekly program for after-school students in Geneva. At the first session, students learned about the Astrological calendar and the Zodiac signs, including its history and relevance from the time it was formed up to present day, and

- now, pseudo-science standing. Each participant was able to go online and print out a birth chart unique to them.
- Jim saw a total of 29 people at his two (2) Rae-Ann **Reading Circles**. They finished <u>The Journal of Scott Allen Collins</u> by Walter Dean Myers. Afterwards, Jim gave them an impromptu history lecture about World War II, and they told him about loved ones who had served in the war. 15 people attended his Geneva Center for Nursing and Rehab Reading Circles where they finished Ray Bradbury's collection of short stories, <u>One More for the Road</u>. Some of the stories sparked discussion with the residents.
- Five (5) members of the **Senior Center Book Club** read, <u>My name is Lucy Barton</u> by Elizabeth Strout.
- The **Ashcraft Activity Adventure** group (17 participants) enjoyed the movie *Autumn* and the Black Jaguar. They also created papercrafts and played video games. The **Active Day** group (14 participants) watched the movie, *Paws of Fury: The Legend of Hank*, and some members checked out books and DVDs. We plan to continue these collaborative programs with the Board of Developmental Disabilities through October, break for the winter, and resume them again in the spring.
- Our **Tech Connect** programs in both Geneva and Ashtabula are well attended. Dwight is focused on serving as many members of the community as possible. To that end, we are limiting each time slot to a maximum of 30 minutes, and the goal is to keep as many as possible to 10 minutes or less. Our patrons are *very* happy to receive this service. There is usually a "line".
- The August genealogy program, *Researching Your Union Civil War Ancestors*, was attended by nine (9) in-house and 22 online attendees.
- Carrie went to the **ACCOA Center for Active Living** to assist patrons with their genealogical research. There were seven (7) attendees.
- Passive Programming in Ashtabula:
 - o Blind Date with a Book: Juvenile Mysteries: 36 checkouts.
 - o Adult Coloring Club: five (5) participants.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT & OUTREACH

• Youth Services and Outreach Services worked together to cover all school open houses for Geneva Area City Schools and the elementary campus of Ashtabula Area City Schools. Staff met students and caregivers, sharing library events info and swag. Dwight, Pamela and Andy (with YO worker, Clay) also attended *AACS Dragon Bash*. Tina and

Teresa attended *Buckeye Local Schools' Back to School Bash*, and Sybil and Ryan attended the *City of Geneva's Back to School* event.

- Members of Outreach Services joined Teresa, David and Ryan to provide a bookmobile stop, games, library swag and events info at **Geneva's** *Movies Under the Stars* event on August 5.
- The bookmobile took part in the **Austinburg Country Days** Parade.
- Rebecca attended one Ashtabula Rotary Club meeting.
- Lyn attended the bi-monthly meeting of **Partners with a Purpose**.
- Carrie attended both the America 250th Committee meeting and the July 4, 2026, Celebration Committee meetings.
- Mike attended a **Ashtabula Lions** Board Meeting and participated in the Lion's Club Pancake Breakfast. Of note, due to some reorganization in the club, Mike has swapped roles with the Club Treasurer and is now serving in that capacity.

MARKETING

- Rebecca quickly designed and ordered signs for the **Bill & Pat Douglass Children's Room**, the restroom, and the book sale room in Geneva. She gauged a color match by eye and came very, very close to the original sign colors. Painesville Publishing got the signs back to us very quickly, and Josh installed them within hours of receipt.
- The **September Library Card Sign-Up Month** campaign allows new and renewing card holders to be entered into a drawing to win a Kindle Fire tablet. All check outs (returning patrons) will be entered into a second drawing to win a library swag bag (a tote bag, water bottle, tee shirt, lunch bag, pen, and bookmark).
- Social media: The top three posts on social media this month were those featuring the photos of the expansion in Geneva and the Grand Opening—which is not surprising! We had a lot of nice photo posts this month thanks to the new volunteer and staff members who have sent in photos of programs.
- The most clicked on program of the **Augusts Highlights** email was the Youth Services Open House, followed very closely by the two Studio Workshop programs.
- Book displays in Geneva included materials on the themes *Dog Days of Summer, Staff Favorites, Art Appreciation,* and *Oceans/Beaches*.
- Book displays in Ashtabula included materials on the themes *Color Our World Summer Reading, Back to School, Dog Days of Summer, All About Pies –* fiction and nonfiction,

and *Pirates* - nonfiction books about pirates both modern and historical. The Adult Fiction end caps featured *Summer Reads*.
