PUBLIC SERVICE

- 19,521 visitors graced the doors of the Ashtabula, Geneva, ACDL Bookmobile, and Lakeside Junior High School libraries during the month of November, with 7,997 items borrowed remotely from our Digital Library.
- 19 **COVID** home test kits were distributed; 229 faxes were sent; and 129 documents were **notarized** from our Ashtabula and Geneva libraries.
- The community organizations that used the Robert S. - Community organizations using the Robert S. Morrison Foundation Community Room and other meeting spaces in the Geneva library included AARP Tax-Aide, Ashtabula County Board of Elections, Ashtabula County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Ashtabula County Health Department, Ashtabula County SHRM, Aspire, Ashtabula County Master Gardners, Community Counseling Center, Geneva Athletic Boosters, Geneva Country Quilters, Geneva Kiwanis Club, Geneva Rotary Club, Help Me Grow!, Life Without Chains (NA Group), Modern Literary Group, Platt R. Spencer Historical Society, Spencerian Writers Group.
- Outreach staff made 15 Express Deliveries, delivering 26 items, and made 15 House Call visits, delivering 109 items. 317 items were left at book drop locations in Ashtabula Township, Geneva-on-the-Lake, and Pierpont.
- 500 community members from Geneva Precincts 6 & 7 visited the Geneva Library to register their vote on November 4.
- Bailey conducted informational sessions and hands-on assistance in the Studio with two
 (2) patrons who scheduled appointments and 16 walk-in adult patrons. 37 additional adults came in for tours and planning sessions.
- The first upload of digitized microfilm is available on the **Ashtabula County District Library Digital Newspaper Collection** website hosted by Ohio Memory. This first upload includes the Ashtabula Beacon Record, Jan 01, 1900 Jul 05, 1902.

PROGRAMMING

- 18 people attended Jim's **Geneva Center for Nursing & Rehab Reading Circles**, and 24 people attended his **Rae Ann Reading Circles**. Both groups continue to read <u>Skipping Christmas</u> by John Grisham.
- Eight (8) people attended Elizabeth's **Coffee and Conversation** and discussed arachnid superwebs, the history of the word *dude*, hundreds of sheep being herded through downtown Berlin, and mandatory greetings at Target stores.
- Six (6) people joined Elizabeth at **Geneva Book Club** and discussed <u>Fahrenheit 451</u> by Ray Bradbury.
- Geneva Cookbook Club shared mixed feelings about the book, What's for Dessert by Claire Saffitz. While club members appreciated the baking tips, tricks, and general guidance provided in the opening chapter, most were disappointed with the recipes. (All members were in agreement, however, about the recipe, execution, and deliciousness of the key lime pie monthly participant Gerry taught us to make!)
- Baily led two (2) General Adult and two (2) Senior Session **Studio Programs.** Participants used the sublimation printer and the heat press to create personally designed crossword puzzles and used the sublimation printer and heat press to create winter ornaments. 39 guests visited the Studio to create and design their own bottle openers during the ACDL Foundation's *Books & Brews* event.
- Keith and Bailey led four (4) sessions of **Studio Workshop for Teens**. Students really enjoyed using the Glowforge design space to customize their own checker boards and pieces and relished using the sublimation printer to create their own designs to print on a mug using the heat press. They repeated this process, too, to create their own unique patterns on pairs of socks (which they proudly wore and showed off). They also used the laser engraver to create scannable codes of links to their favorite song onto an acrylic charm. Now they can scan their charm to bring them directly to their chosen song via the Spotify app!
- Tiffany emphasized personal creativity paired with fine-motor skill practice in leading teens in **Gizmos & Gadgets**. They used multi-colored beads to create bracelets and necklaces and competed in several LEGO building challenges (both as teams and as individual players).
- Teens designed and carved stamps using rubber erasers and lithograph carving tools in Geneva's **Afterschool Art Club.** They also created an Egon Schiele-inspired Autumn Landscape after studying Schiele's painting *Four Trees* (1917), leading to a discussion of atmospheric perspectives and how to use them to create the illusion of depth in landscape paintings. They thoroughly enjoyed a unit studying John James Audubon's *Wild Turkey* painting and created their own colored-pencil turkey illustrations inspired by his work.

- Crafty teens in Geneva enjoyed making rag-tie wreaths using scraps of fabric cut into one-inch-wide strips that they double knotted in a pattern around a metal wreath frame in Teen **Crafternoon**. Teens also enjoyed making pom-pom backpack charms by using colorful yarn, beads, and a larger clasp for their charms. (This was extremely popular, and the boys really enjoyed this program!) Another week, they had a "free design day" making characters with Perler beads. They particularly loved the Thanksgiving week activity of coloring vintage paper dolls that had jointed arms, legs, and heads using fasteners. Most popular were the woodland animal-themed paper dolls like *Little Red Riding Hood* and the *Big Bad Wolf*!
- Teens who attended David's **Mad Science** classes after school enjoyed various Lego builds this month, starting with a diorama of a habitat that a pre-selected mini figure would live in. The following week they built a bridge and ramp then added small vehicles that forced them to test the durability of their designs. They particularly enjoyed the unit where they built skyscrapers and tested their earthquake survivability. Many had awesome (and well-constructed) designs that survived big earthquakes on their shake table (a table designed to mimic the shaking of an earthquake and an app on their phone compares it to real-life earthquakes).
- David also led **Role Playing Games** for Geneva teens. Students continued exploring the depths of dungeons in the Shadowdark gaming system (a game like D&D). Players have now designed their own characters and spent a session in the Studio printing 3D mini figurines of their characters. (They also enjoyed painting them after they were printed!)
- Writer's Block programs focused on short stories about *Fall* and *Thanksgiving*. In one prompt, teens were tasked with a family dinner scenario where the main character must make an uncomfortable announcement to the rest of the family during their dinner. A popular (and difficult) prompt was the task of creating a poem based on fall colors like *orange* or *red*.
- Tiffany led Geneva youth in **Survival Skills**, which focused on practical emergency preparedness. Tiffany introduced CPR basics, essential first-aid care, and how to recognize and respond using the Emergency Response System. Teens practiced building miniature traps and snares using KEVA planks for their hands-on portion of the program. Participants also received a small tin "survival kit" containing a compass, paracord, carabiner clips, assorted bandages/gauze, and knot-tying guides.
- Geneva teens used Perler beads to create hieroglyphic symbols (such as the *Eye of Horace* and the *ankh*) as part of **Signs, Signals, & Codes.** They enjoyed learning about the ancient Egyptian alphabet and the use of pictures and symbols as part of their "writing." Attendees also learned about common ancient Celtic symbols used in jewelry design and created their own jewelry using designs like the *Tree of Life, The Trinity Knot*, and more.

- November's **Stir It Up!** cooking classes focused on baking. Blueberry muffins and minipumpkin pies were the recipes, and they were a big hit! Tina also discussed with the teens the importance of keeping the kitchen clean and organized while cooking, and they put theory into practice during these baking sessions.
- Teens had a blast this month with cozy fall coffeehouse style drinks in Sybil's **Become a Barista!** They made a White Chocolate Mocha using while chocolate and homemade vanilla syrup (using vanilla extract, sugar, and water), and Iced Caramel Macchiato, and a Cherry Mocha Latte, which required them to make hot chocolate from scratch and add cherry flavored syrup at the end. (The big thrill was using the milk frothier for the Cherry Mocha Latte, a first for all the teens participating that day!)
- Homeschoolers at the Library groups studied a picture of da Vinci's *Mona Lisa* then used a template to create their very own versions. They also enjoyed making Turkey Family paintings inspired by John James Audubon's *Wild Turkey* and other paintings. They loved a session requiring them to build Turkey Cozy Coops, an engineering challenge where the students were given a turkey toy and KEVA blocks and were tasked to build a coop.
- Geneva's **Little Scientists** enjoyed engineering a balloon-powered rocket ship launched along a string to maintain control of their ships. They had fun drawing turkeys and using art supplies from the maker cart to color and decorate them. And they loved building Lego Marble Mazes and watching their marbles roll through their designs!
- Little Scientists in Ashtabula created an Animal Hibernation Lab where they talked about which animals hibernate, which animals hibernate the longest, where they hibernate, etc. The students each then picked an animal and a book about that animal to help them build a mock Lego shelter for their chosen animal to hibernate in. Students also had a coding day where they programmed coding mice to get through mazes they created. And they, too, loved creating Turkey Cozy Coops with KEVA planks.
- Geneva Storytime preschoolers and their caregivers especially enjoyed a moon-themed week, and the kids loved Papa Please Get the Moon for Me by Eric Carle with its large, fold out pages (talking about the moon being made from cheese really made them giggle). A Family Meals theme was popular, too, and the rhyming text of Bee-Bim Bop by Linda Sue Park had the children repeating with Tina "Hungry, hungry, hungry for some Bee-Bim Bop!" This book also has the recipe included, so they can read the book and make the meal.
- Highlights of **Ashtabula Storytime** include a dragon-themed week featuring the books <u>King Jack and the Dragon</u> by Peter Bently and <u>Dragon Was Terrible</u> by Kelly DiPucchio. Teresa brought out a dragon puppet, and the children loved taking turns playing with it. Also extremely popular was a special Thanksgiving storytime event featuring <u>Bear Says Thanks</u> by Karma Wilson and <u>Setting the Turkeys Free</u> by W.

Nikola-Lisa. Kiddos really enjoyed a craft based on the Kilola-Lisa book where they used large hand-stamp pads to create handprint turkeys.

- **Rhythm Band** preschoolers still love the *Bean Bag Song* by Hap Palmer the most. With much practice, everyone has mastered a difficult part of the song where it prompts them to balance a bean bag on different body parts in quick succession. When they first started using the song, everyone struggled, but this month all preschoolers followed along easily!
- Eight patrons enjoyed making cards, crafts, and holiday decorations at the Winter Wonderland Holiday Open Art Lab.
- At the **Senior Center Book Club**, seven (7) patrons discussed <u>Women</u> by Kristin Hannah.
- Passive Programs at the Ashtabula Library included *Blind Date with a Book: Ohio History* (17 checkouts), *Staff Picks* (10 checkouts), and *Creative Coloring Club* (7 participants).
- The November **Genealogy Program**, *Finding Ancestors in Your Family Tree*, was attended by 36 patrons, three (3) in person and 33 online.
- Austin presented 50 Years: The Gales of November, Ashtabula and Edmund Fitzgerald, in honor of the 50th anniversary of the sinking of the Fitzgerald. There were 49 attendees, nine (9) online, and 40 in person.
- **Tech Connect** continues to be a popular program. Dwight assisted one patron in the setup of a new Android phone, and one of our regulars was overjoyed that the skills she has learned at this program have resulted in several recent sales on Etsy.
- The Writers' Group welcomed two (2) new members. They were quite excited to join a community of writers who share their work and provide one another with peer feedback.
